

Óró Sé do Bheatha Bhaile

Many variations of this song exist. The most common version sung nowadays is that of Pádraig Pearse. He composed this version to inspire Irish people to fight for independence. The title of this rebel song implies a welcome home cheer. It was sung by the volunteers during the 1916 Easter Rising. Grace O'Malley, the Pirate Queen and legend of Irish folklore, also known as Gráinne Mhaol, is mentioned in the song.

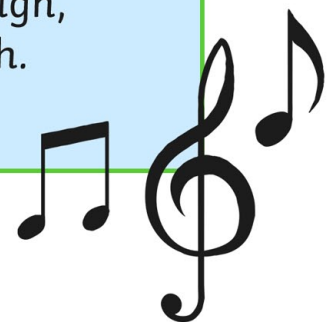
'Anois ar theacht an tSamhraidh', the last line of the chorus, is symbolic as it signifies the vision of the Rising bringing a bright future for Ireland.
